A One-stop Location For Information A Sailor Would Want

Reading through the pages on www.great-lakessailing.com, it should be clear that I love both sailing and the Great Lakes, I have been hooked ever since that fateful afternoon nearly 30 years ago when I first set foot on a friend's sailboat in Bayfield, ON. For me, to sail the Great Lakes is about as close to heaven as it gets!

Within months I had bought a sailboat, doing just about everything wrong. My friend asked me what I had bought and all I could say was that it was a sailboat and it was green! However, I had done one thing absolutely right and that was buying it from a superb sailor who then set about the task of teaching me to sail it.

That purchase began a life-long love affair with sailing and with the Great Lakes. Me and my Hughes sailed countless miles on Lake Erie, exploring ports and harbours on both sides of the lake. Over the years, I have sailed and explored Lakes Ontario, Erie, Huron and Superior and each experience has only deepened my love of these vast inland seas.

In addition to sailing my own boat, I joined the Canadian Coast Guard Auxiliary and sailed on a 35-foot 'Hike-style' patrol craft powered with twin diesel engines. So clearly, I do not buy into the "us vs them" mentality that some hold about power boaters and sail boaters. Once we slip the lines, we are all sailors.

As a Training Officer, I developed training materials and, of course, began to collect all kinds of bits and pieces of information. There are many places on the Internet where you can find information. But, there was no one place where I

could get all the information that I wanted on ports, port facilities, ideas on navigation and cruising, safety, etc. Finally, I figured that I might as well write it myself. And <u>www.great-lakessailing.com</u> was born.

I had two principal goals when I set up www.greatlakes-sailing.com. First was to provide an overview of this vast lake system, which is one of the finest cruising grounds in the world. Calling them 'lakes' is a serious misnomer. The Great Lakes basin is really a vast inland sea system. Second, and more important, was to leave each reader with the sense that cruising this fabulous inland sea system is perfectly doable.

To accomplish that, I wanted to provide readers with a comprehensive listing and description of ports-ofcall around the Great Lakes basin and a selection of articles that cover a broad range of topics that matter to sailors.

So, I sat down and made an outline of the information that I would want if I was out exploring. I don't think I am any different from most other cruisers. The format I settled on is what you see today. (Along the way, I learned how to write passable html code as well!) From an initial target of 100 ports, the site now has about 180 port descriptions and continues to grow with new additions each month. These ports range from Kingston in the east to Duluth at the head of Lake Superior. Want to know about neat harbours, hidden gems, fascinating museums or perfect little pubs? Its all here.

Beyond the port reviews, there are a number of topics under the general heading of Seamanship. These include pages on Weather, Navigation, First Aid, Border Crossings, etc. There is a selection of free resources as well.

The website is free to use and there are ample opportunities for readers to provide feedback. (Drop by the website and say 'hello'.) Rhumb Line, our newsletter, opens another avenue of conversation and gives a way to provide other interesting bits of information about our lakes.

The results have been gratifying. Obviously, there was a need to be filled – some 20-25 thousand people a month read the site. I hear from sailors most days. It also motivated me to work on some other projects – foremost among them to write a log book. I could never find a log book that suited me so finally, I sat down and designed my own. I wondered if it would appeal to others and it turned out that it did. Its modest cost has helped defray the expenses of operating the website.

The site has led to speaking engagements at boat shows, yacht clubs and businesses.

I have thoroughly enjoyed working on the site. When the cold winter winds blow and our sloop slumbers away up north, it keeps me engaged and in contact with other sailors.

We are so fortunate to live by the Great Lakes. This is a one-of-a-kind gift and I encourage everyone to go out and experience it. Go visit some new ports – not just the same ones you have visited each summer for years. Cross the lake to the United States if you haven't already. Plan a voyage up to one of the lakes you haven't visited. Go explore! It is a safe, achievable adventure. There is no place like this; there is no time like now.
